Reading

- Students will be learning their letters this year and may begin to read this year.
- Alphabet linking charts will go home soon please practice until your child has mastered identifying all of the uppercase and lowercase letters, and sounds associated with those letters.
- Beginning sight word lists will be sent home later in the year.
- While reading with your child, help your child think about the text.

Questions To Ask While Reading To Your Child

- **Who** Who are the characters in the story?
- **<u>What</u>** What is happening in the story?
- **Where** Where is the story taking place?
- **When** When is the story taking place?
- <u>Why</u>- Why are the characters thinking or feeling a certain way in the story?

Questions To Ask Your Child Continued

- What was the main idea or big idea in this story? What did the author want us to know or learn?
- Did this story remind you of something? If so what?
 Did you have a connection to this story?
- What is happening in the pictures? What information can we get from looking at the pictures?
- Can you make a prediction? What do you think will happen at the end of this story?

Math

- This year we are learning to count to 30.
- We will be working with story/ word problems.
- Learning how to recognize and extend simple patterns.
- Creating and using graphs.

Ways To Use Math At Home

- Practice counting with your child on a daily basis.
 First to 20, then to 30, and beyond. Really help your child focus on correctly stating their teen numbers.
- Sort out different objects that are already in your home.
- Play and use math. *For example: I have 5 pennies, show the 5 pennies to your child, then hide 3, but show them 2 and ask them, "So how many pennies am I hiding?"

Ways To Use Math At Home Continued

- Help your child with noticing and looking for patterns.
- Play board games that involve counting spaces, etc.

Other Curricular Topics

<u>Responsive Classroom-</u> We will focus on creating a social and emotional sense of belonging!

Report Cards
