I. CALL TO ORDER

A. Larry O. called the meeting to order at 6:35pm

II. PUBLIC COMMENTARY - No public commentary

III. APPROVAL OF MINUTES of the March 12, 2024 meeting. A motion was made by Stacy E. and seconded by Hannah S. that the meeting minutes of March 12, 2024 be approved.

IV. OLD BUSINESS - None

V. NEW BUSINESS

- A. Presentation: Rec & Ed's Before/After School Childcare & Camp programs Kate Porter, BACC Manager
 - a. Jenna Bacolor, Donna Dishman & Kate Porter presented on Before/After Care Update
 - i. Overview Jenna
 - 1. History & Program Structure
 - a. Program started in the 1970's
 - b. One classroom in each building
 - c. Y5-5th Grade
 - 2. 2023-24 Locations
 - a. Abbot, Allen, Angell, Carpenter, Dicken After Care only, Lakewood, Mitchell, Pittsfield (After Care only, combined with Allen) and Wines
 - b. Focus on Title 1 after pandemic
 - c. 3 Outside Providers: Burns Park, King and Lawton
 - d. Jenna B. explained that Title 1 is a federal designation and reflection of poverty level
 - e. Hannah S. asked how many schools had programs prior to the pandemic.
 - i. Jenna B. said 19 elementary schools had a before and after care
 - program. All but three were run by Rec & Ed
 - ii. Program Highlights Kate
 - 1. A Year of Growth

- a. Program Quality
 - 3 program directors who oversee 3 sites each, infused into programs, weekly site supervisor meetings, consistent professional development opportunities
 - ii. PD on early release days and must have 16 hours of training
- b. Staff Development
 - i. On-site Weikart Center coach providing trainings for staff and coaching with administrators
 - ii. Partnerships with the U School to implement consistent language for Plans for Peace and Conflict across programs
 - iii. Mindfulness training for staff to bring into programming for youth
 - iv. Training from Zingtrain:
 - 1. Living Servant Leadership
 - 2. Systems for Supporting Staff
 - 3. Bottom Line Change
 - v. Manager participated in state-level Youth Driven Spaces Community of Practice
- c. Hiring & Recruiting
 - i. Indeed hiring met with Indeed multiple times during year
 - ii. Only loss 2 staff members this year
 - iii. What we did:
 - 1. Developed recruitment plan with Indeed. Met monthly with Indeed representatives to boost postings and recruitment.
 - 2. Continuous interviews through the whole year
 - 3. Recruited high school students to work in programs
 - 4. Pay increase and opportunity for 12 month schedule
 - iv. How it worked:
 - 1. More applicants, more hires and higher retention
- d. Family Engagement
 - i. Each site held 2 Family Engagement Nights: Winter Solstice and Spring into Wellness
 - ii. Attendance was amazing
 - iii. Student planned activities and decorations for events
- 2. Parent Survey Results
 - a. 44 Families filled out the survey
 - b. Asked about welcoming environment, student voice, customer service and positive interactions
 - c. Percentages were 80% or greater
 - d. Larry O. asked how many kids are in the program
 - i. Kate P. replied that 25-36 and varies by site
 - e. Naomi G. asked if this is independent from enrichment classes
 - i. Kate P. responded that it is different from classes
 - f. Stacy E. asked about staff pay
 - i. Kate P. replied that starting pay is \$16.83
 - 1. Pay is for an assistant with a high school diploma/GED

- g. Hannah S. asked if sites are at capacity
 - i. Kate P. replied that there are still spaces available and they leave space available for scholarship families
- h. Larry O. asked if there is a fee associated with the program
 - i. Kate P. responded yes and that the fee will be reduced for upcoming year due to opening up more locations
- i. Jenna B. mentioned that by adding more locations for Fall, they can pay staff more and reduce the monthly fee for families
- j. Stacy E. asked about the part time options
 - i. Kate P. responded that families can enroll for M/W/F and/or Tu/Th
- k. Naomi G. asked how can we help people understand what all is going on with the program
 - i. Jenna B. said they are updating the website to make sure information is accurate and seeing how they can get information out there
- 1. Kate P. mentioned that they have brought in new and exciting activities. They do not consider this day care. Want to make sure kids have a safe and fun place to go to after school
- m. Jenna B. mentioned that if RAC members see misinformation, provide people with the correct information
- n. Stacy E. mentioned AAPS staff spotlights and it would be nice to highlight child care employees
- iii. Challenges/Opportunities Donna
 - 1. BAC Challenges
 - a. Budget
 - i. Used federal, state and county grants in the previous two years
 - 1. Grants ended on 6/30/2023
 - ii. The 23-24 program will end the year with an estimated deficit of \$168,000
 - 1. Planned for this deficit
 - b. Enrollment
 - i. 30 full time, full payment registrations are needed to break even
 - ii. 23-24 average was 21 full time, full payment registrations
 - c. Staffing
 - i. Each site needs a minimum of 3 qualified full time staff
 - 1. Have a supervisor, assistant and high school student
 - ii. Recruiting and hiring happens year round
 - d. Transportation
 - i. A flexible transportation system would aid in providing additional care opportunities
 - e. These challenges are something they can handle and are aware of them
 - i. Larry O. asked about deficit and the total
 - 1. Donna D. said it is a little over 2 million and Rec & Ed is their own fund

- 2. BAC Opportunities
 - a. Program Enhancements
 - i. Keeps children and parents engaged
 - b. Increased Opportunities for AAPS High School Students
 - c. Providing additional fee waivers
- iv. Goals for 2024-25 and Beyond Kate
 - 1. Opening 4 new sites: Bach, Eberwhite, Logan and Thurston
 - a. Fall of 2024 they will have 13 locations
 - 2. Continue to hire and recruit
 - 3. Increase school day connections with teachers and principals
 - a. Would like bi-monthly meetings with principals to keep them up to date
 - 4. Piloting new model to increase community connections and enrichment classes
 - a. Program did just receive a \$3,000 grant from Kiwanis
 - b. Want kids to be able to take classes while at child care
 - 5. Larry O. asked how many buildings do not currently have child care
 - a. Jenna B. responded that 3 elementary schools do not have child care -Bryant, Pattengill and Haisley. They surveyed all schools for interest and to see what locations they can open in the Fall.
 - 6. Stacey E. suggested presenting program to the board of education
 - 7. Larry O. asked if there could be sponsorships for child care
 - a. Donna D. said they could come up with the right package and sponsors could be very interested in this especially engagement nights. They could definitely expand
 - b. Jenna B. mentioned that there was a sponsor roughly 6 years ago
 - c. Kate P. mentioned that they partnered with pizza places for winter engagement night and they gave a discount on items
 - d.
